

- 2019 amendment to QQI's legislation:
 - New criminal offences (facilitation and promotion of academic cheating)
 - New responsibilities for QQI (prosecutor)
- **BUT legislation not a silver bullet**

The newly formed Global Academic Integrity Network (GAIN) is working to stamp out the multi-billion-dollar contract cheating operations which have flourished in recent years as online learning and assessment have become more prevalent.
